ALTOONA SECTION

The Altoona Section held its third meeting of the new season on November 19, 1980 at the Western Sizzlin' Steak House in Duncansville.

The program, sponsored by Vipond & Vipond, Inc., was presented by Mark Erickson from Bell Telephone Company.

Mr. Erickson, a communications specialist with Bell, explained the latest advancements in LASER communications. His discussion included using LASER's with fiber optics in telephone communications, the process of converting existing phone lines to the LASER system, as well as the advantages and disadvantages of such a conversion.

Jack Stefanko, Section President, reported on the status of the letters sent to the 13 state legislators in the Section area requesting support for a gas tax change to supply a stable funding base for the Pa. Department of Transportation.

Several legislators acknowledged receipt of the letter and one, Representative Rick Geist of Altoona, specifically stated he will vote for a change in the funding base.

HARRISBURG SECTION

Recent dinner meetings of the Harrisburg Section featured informative programs on two diverse but timely topics---highway safety engineering and concrete pavement recycling.

On December 1, Mr. F.J. Tamanini, a nationally known research consultant with Energy Absorption Systems, Inc. of Virginia, described latest stateof-the-art methods of achieving improved highway safety through the design and development of a "forgiving" road system.

With a wide array of visual aids, the speaker detailed research-based test results for a variety of modern railings, inertial type crash cushions, slip-base liminaire supports, and damage-limiting structural guardrail.

Formerly a Division Engineer with the Federal Highway Administration, Tamanini has conducted numerous non-commercial and public service seminars nationwide in the field of highway safety engineering.

On January 5, a local ASHE Section member, William C. Berg of Mechanicsburg, discussed innovative and energy efficient applications of concrete payement recycling.

Berg, a professional engineer with the Portland Cement Association, outlined recent material recycling experience with a \$113 million reconstruction project along 15 miles of the Edens Expressway in Chicago.

The project, completed in 1980, involved total pavement reconstruction along a 6 lane urban expressway while some 113,000 vehicles were maintained daily.

Some 40 local section members were on hand for each program, both held in Harding's Restaurant, Camp Hill.

For local section members and guests, upcoming programs in 1981 will include dinner meetings February 19 and April 7, a Ladies Nite Social on March 7, and a Section Picnic on May 4th.

The Franklin Section of ASHE recently held one of its more important meetings at the Maennerchor Club at 1607 State St., Erie, Pa.

The meeting was especially well attended and was presided over by Section President, Michael J. Suich, from Greenville, Pa., Engr. for PennDOT.

The program was hosted by Ray Schreckengost, President of Mayer Bros. of Erie, Pa., who arranged a panel discussion type meeting to discuss upcoming PennDOT projects. Present and participating on the panel were city and county officials, elected representatives and officials from the Penna. Dept. of Transportation, District 1-0.

L. W. Petulla, P.E., District Engineer 1-0 outlined the scope of the projects

pending in 1981 in the seven county area of District 1-0 and specifically the Erie County area. He specifically noted which of a number of 80-81 projects are being postponed or scrubbed and that much matching Federal money is again being lost because of PennDOT funding problems.

Jack Baker, 1-0 Engr. and Public Information man also provided additional information and impact on the highway problems and also outlined the Safety Improvement and Betterment projects which are pending.

Tom Hoffman, Executive secretary for Eric Conference on Redevelopment, cited recent information on the early lettings of the I-79 Bridge Projects in Eric. Information from the 1-0 District office indicates a delay in these lettings. Hoffman further discussed the PennDOT Budget and Taxing needs. It was herewith brought out by everyone present and participating that legislative performance in these crucial matters has been somewhat substandard and that the ASHE chapter would henceforth work more closely with the legislators.

Was Mocha - Erie City Engr. told the membership that the PennDOT delays on the lettings have been adding tremendous leads in the city's scheduling and are inflating their costs greatly, since their planning is so closely tied to the Arterials that are planned to be built by the state.

M. O. Smith, Chairman of the Erie Port Authority, detailed how these unbuilt Arterials are adversely affecting the growth of Erie's Port facilities and shipping.

Harold Reslink, Vice Chairman of the Penna. Transportation Commission related how the recently built new (bargain) highway system-Interstates and other such important roads-have greatly improved the economic growth of the state and noted that if the state is to continue to grow, (let alone survive), it will be necessary to continue the improvement of the Penna. Road system. He recommended that ASHE should undertake to educate and inform the public since it is probably the most qualified to undertake a program of this kind. This point was strongly stressed by every member of the panel as well as some of the membership.

Karl Boyes, recently elected legislator from the 3rd District indicated that he would closely study the Highway program and would do all he reasonably could to help solve the Highways

NEW CATHODIC PROTECTION FOR BRIDGE DECK SPALLING

New innovations in the design of cathodic protection systems for preventing corrosion of steel reinforcing bars in existing or new bridges now make it possible to install platinized anodes in shallow saw cuts made directly in the bridge surface. Since there is no need to apply heavy conductive and wear surface overlays, this system overcomes the major problem formerly associated with using cathodic protection to prevent corrosion caused cracking and spalling of bridge pavement.

The new technique, which was developed by Harco Corporation of Medina, Ohio, does not require adding additional thickness or deadload to the structure. Nor does it require expensive raising of expansion joints, scruppers or drains. Also, it can be installed quickly, with minimal traffic disruption

The new cathodic protection system works on the same principle as conventional "pancake anode" systems that have proven successful in bridge applications throughout the country. It applies an external direct current to counteract the electro-chemical process that causes corrosion of the steel reinforcing bars and resulting cracking and spalling. Similar cathodic protection systems have been used for many years to mitigate corrosion of buried pipelines, tanks and offshore structures.

In addition to developing the new technique for installing cathodic protection on bridges, Harco, the leader in the cathodic protection industry for more than 30 years, has developed a method for detecting corrosion on concrete covered steel before delamination, cracking and spalling become observable. This corrosion engineering survey detects, not only existing corrosion, but by taking potential measurement, is able to detect the probability of corrosion occuring before it becomes a serious problem.

Information about bridge deck cathodic protection and corrosion surveys is available to any interested groups in the form of a slide presentation put together by ASHE member Bill Hooker of the Harco Corporation. Smith said plans for apartments at the Arlington Drive site were in limbo for nearly two years because the original plans by a Washington state firm never received a go ahead from the Fm HA. However, the FmHA "Liked the project" and approached Patterson-Erie Smith said.

Smith said he had no progress to report on a 100-unit apartment complex that a New Castle firm plans to build along Route 18 near Transfer. That project will be funded by the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency.

Safer Driving for Salesmen

One of the greatest dangers that a salesman faces is "highway hypnosis," or the lulling of the senses due to monotonous stretches of driving on highways. Here are some tips for keeping awake — and alive: Make frequent stops at regular intervals - 50 miles or less. Get out of the car, walk around and have a nonalcoholic drink.

Change speed every 20 minutes or so. □ Eat only light foods, and moderately, before starting out and while on the road. \Box Change car temperature periodically by opening a window or adjusting the vents.

Wet your eyelids periodically with a moistened finger. □ Suck something pungent, like a lemon drop, to stimulate your taste buds and keep you alert. □ Sit as straight as your car will permit. □ Shift lanes at least twice an hour.

The Accident-Prone Male

Males from ages 15 to 64 have an annual accident death rate of 86.6 per 100,000, a figure surpassed only by deaths from heart disease and cancer, the nation's leading killers. Men between the ages of 15 and 34 are particularly accident-prone. In the 15 to 19 age group, the accident death toll is 12 times that of cancer and 40 times that of heart disease. While death rates due to accidents decline with advancing age, a total of about 56,600 men die each year due to carelessness. How is the safety program at your plant or business?

ERIE CONSTRUCTION FIRM FINALIZES PLANS FOR REYNOLDS APARTMENTS

Construction should begin in about a month on a 48-unit apartment complex in the Reynolds Development area of pymatuning Township which is being financed with a federal Farmers Home Administration mortgage.

The \$1.5 million project will provide rental units for families whose income does not exceed \$15,600, said Paul Horrobin, vice president of Patterson-Erie Corp., an Erie construction firm.

Horrobin met with Gene Smith, managing engineer of the development to discuss plans for "Arlington Manor" which will be built on a six-acre site at Arlington Drive and Ninth Street, across from Seventh Street.

The site was chosen because of its "excellent terrain" which has good drainage, is accessible to water and sewer lines and has "a list of pluses that goes on forever," Horrobin said.

Smith stressed that the complex will be hooked up to a different sewer line than the 14th-20th street area of the development which has been plagued by flooding. He said he expects no problems.

Horrobin said construction should begin immediately after plans a finalized at a pre-construction conference between Patterson-Erie and Robert Meneely, FmHa district director in Franklin. The firm will select sub-contractors in two weeks, he added.

Horrobin said that the complex will be built with the "intent to make everything as nearly like a single detached family home as possible." The grounds will be "heavily landscaped with lots of lawns," he said. There will be blacktopped parking areas.

Rent will be a minimum of \$185 a month, depending on a tenant's income, he said.

He plans to attract the elderly as well as young couples who are just starting out, to provide a "family environment."

Plans by the architectural firm of Creal and Hyde Associates, Warren, Ohio, are for eight ranch-style buildings. The brick buildings will be "highly energy efficient" with insulation, triple glass windows and electric heat.

There will be 38 two-bedroom and eight one-bedroom apartments, with two one-bedroom apartments equipped for the handicapped. The complex will have a laundry, maintenance shop and storage room.

Horrobin said up to four persons will be permitted in the two-bedroom apartments. No pets will be allowed.

An office will be opened at the site about two months before completion and applicants will be handled on a first-come first-serve basis.

He warned that his firm is "very hardnosed" about the conduct of its tenants.

Patterson-Erie will serve as administrative manager, but will employ a hus-

As this issue of the Scanner goes to press, I have received information from six (6) Sections out of Fourteen (14). This is an increase of one more section information contained in the December 1980 issue.


